- 5. Create a composition that actively incorporates points of the surface with uniform brush marks, color rhythm, and spatial relations.
- 6. Create a believable illusion of space in a painting.
- 7. Describe and analyze paintings by self, classmates, and works of previous masters using the language of the discipline.
- 8. Sketch directly on the surface with color, creating efficient activity within the format.
- 9. Develop light effects with color by observing three-dimensional objects accurately.
